

## Imagine walking your child to school!



Up until about 5 years ago, you hardly ever heard about neighbors from the Garden District sending their kids to the Dufrocg School for their elementary education, even though Dufrocg is located right across Government Street from the neighborhood.

The list of elementary schools that our Garden District kids have attended over the last 20+ years has always included a broad range of excellent options such as private schools, LSU Lab School, magnet schools such as BRCVPA or Westdale Magnet, or public schools with gifted & talented programs.

However, five years ago, Dufrocq School made some changes that bumped them up into that group of more viable choices, and the good news is that our Garden District kids have priority admissions to the Dufrocg School's magnet programs because of our close proximity!

Named for the first mayor of Baton Rouge, John R. Dufrocq (mayor from 1850 - 1855),

a special place in local history; many prominent people and some of our long-time Garden District residents started their education as Dufrocq Ducks.

However, at some point in or after the 1960s, Bernard Terrace became the public school for the attendance zone, which included the Garden District neighborhood. From that time until 2009, Dufrocq School housed mostly a traditional public school with a small Montessori program, and very few Garden District neighbors attended.

In 2008-09, Dufrocq underwent a giant renovation and expansion, which took 2 years and \$20 million to complete. When it reopened in the fall of 2009, the new Dufrocq School added a new academic magnet program, and the attendance zone was redrawn to include the Garden District.

Being in the Dufrocg attendance zone gives our residents a huge advantage when applying to the two Dufroca magnet programs, which in 2012 won the "New and Emerging School

of Excellence" award from the Magnet Schools of America.

Dufrocq currently enrolls a total of 654 students. There are three district programs under one roof: an academic magnet program for K-5, a Montessori magnet program for preK-5, and a traditional program for preK-5.

Dufrocq also offers extracurricular activities such as running clubs, an orchestra, a "Microsociety" program, and a Slow Foods

Baton Rouge program featuring the Dufrocq garden.

If you have a child entering pre-K to 5th grade in the next year or two, and you have an interest in the Montessori or academic magnet programs at Dufrocq, you are invited and welcome to attend the Dufrocq Open House Tuesday, October 14, from 9:00am until 3:00pm. 
